When the first Broadcast Industry Conference convened at San Francisco State University as a campus radio station banquet in 1950, television was in its infancy—nationwide network linkage hadn't been completed, and both color broadcasts and program retention on video tape were in development phases. Advance communications systems which relay information and entertainment via satellite directly to an audience able to retrieve this information from libraries in their own homes were futuristic visions shared by a small community of dreamers, engineers, and scientists. Both the Conference and the industry it was designed to examine have undergone tremendous changes since then.

The Conference, now in its thirty-first year, has been renamed the Media Awards & Conference. It has evolved into a fourm where professionals, educators, and students gather for several days to discuss the issues and responsibilities which touch and influence an ever-widening global community.

The 1982 Conference theme, "On The Air: Power and Personality," explores the ethical considerations and program decisions confronting those presently in the broadcast industry as they meet the new challenges and responsibilities that the increasing power of the communication media demands.


FROM THE NORTH:
