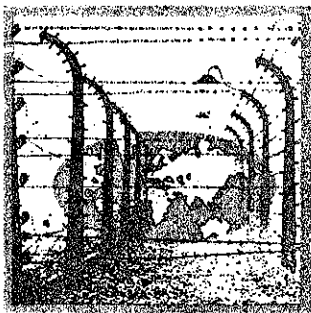

To the best of our knowledge there has never been a Conference that has linked the Holocaust with the genocides of other peoples as a problem of human beings everywhere. Also, there has not been a concerted interdisciplinary effort to prevent recurrence of such crimes against mankind.

The goal of the Conference throughout is to project genocide as a universal problem in the history and future of all peoples; to honor the national and historic concerns of each people who has been fated to suffer a tragedy of mass destruction; and at the same time, to correlate these concerns with one another so that every event of genocide also reflects and articulates a concern for the destruction of all peoples.

This Conference is planned to make a real contribution towards the prevention of future calamities through understanding how to intervene and to clarify what each of the professions can contribute towards prediction and prevention.

The Conference will be organized around the following Tracks which are listed with their respective Chairpersons. Each of these Chairpersons will also lead a 2-day Intensive Dialogue Workshop, with limited-registration groups, preceding the Conference.

INTENSIVE DIALOGUE WORKSHOP - JUNE 17-18, 1982

Workshops are limited to 40 participants, only those having a min. of 20 registrants are held.

The purpose of the two-day workshops is to provide an opportunity for participants to explore intensively a specific area that relates to the Holocaust and genocides of all other peoples. Ultimately, the goal of the workshop process is to develop an inter-disciplinary process towards preventing future recurrences of such tragedies. ELIE WIESEL will address the opening and closing Plenary Sessions.

1. YEHUDA BAUER, Ph.D., JEWISH-GENTILE RELATIONSHIPS IN NAZI-OCCUPIED EUROPE - Development of the relations between Jews and their non-Jewish neighbors preceding and during the war.
2. BEN WHITAKER, GENOCIDE, REAL AND POTENTIAL: MINORITY GROUP RIGHTS - A realistic assessment of ongoing genocide in the world today, and of the potential for new acts of genocide around the globe.
3. ALAN DERSHOWITZ, J.D., THE ROLE OF THE LAW IN COMBATTING GENOCIDE - An advocacy session - devoted to both international and domestic law, and to governmental and non-governmental organizational processes.
4. FRANK REYNOLDS, THE PERFORMANCE OF THE MEDIA DURING THE HOLOCAUST: LESSONS FOR CONTEMPORARY AND FUTURE SITUATIONS - Practicing journalists and academics in the field of communications are invited to this workshop to review the performance of the media during the Holocaust, and to try to apply the lessons of the experience to contemporary and future situations.
5. SAUL MENDLOVITZ, J.D., A WORLD PERSPECTIVE OF GENOCIDE - This workshop will explore the elimination of genocide through international community processes.
6. LAURIE S. WISEBERG, Ph.D., THE RESPONSES OF GOVERNMENTS, INTER-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS, AND NON-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS TO GENOCIDE - The workshop will explore, compare and contrast responses to genocidal situations by governments, inter-governmental and non-governmental organizations.
7. REV. FRANKLIN H. LITTELL, Ph.D., TEACHING THE HOLOCAUST AND GENOCIDE - Participants in this workshop will share information on teaching programs, techniques, materials and tools, and will examine resistances to learning about the Holocaust and genocide.
8. SHAMAI DAVIDSON, M.D., PSYCHOLOGICAL ISSUES IN THE LIVES OF SURVIVORS AND THEIR FAMILIES - The treatment of traumatized and persecuted people, special requirements of psycho-therapy.
9. ROBERT J. LIFTON, M.D., PSYCHOHISTORICAL ASPECTS OF THE HOLOCAUST AND GENOCIDE - The role of the Nazi doctors in the Holocaust. Collective psychic processes such as psychic numbing, the pursuit of immortality, and omnipotent aspects of power.
10. JOHN SOMERVILLE, Ph.D., Litt.D. & SHINGO SHIBATA, NUCLEAR WEAPONRY & ECOCIDAL TECHNOLOGY: THE EXTENSION OF THE THREAT OF THE HOLOCAUST & GENOCIDE TO ALL HUMANKIND - Nuclear weaponry and ecocidal technology extend the threat of Holocaust and genocide to humankind as a whole. We must prevent Hiroshima in order to live at all; we must prevent Auschwitz in order to live and make life worth living.
11. RABBI MARC H. TANENBAUM, DEHUMANIZATION AS A PRELUDE TO GENOCIDE: DEVELOPING AN EARLY WARNING SYSTEM - How does the demonic legacy of dehumanization by the Nazis contribute to subsequent dehumanization? What can we do to construct an early warning system?
12. SIDRA EZRACHI, Ph.D. & JOHN FELSTINER, Ph.D., CREATION IN THE SHADOW OF CATASTROPHE: THE ARTISTIC RESPONSE TO THE HOLOCAUST - The imaginative response to the Holocaust in literature, cinema and the popular arts, and comparisons with the literature and art of other major human catastrophies including the response to the atomic bomb.

Deadline: January 31, 1982.

Presentations are invited on any of the above topics for delivery at various Conference sessions, symposia, panels, dialogues, and workshops, including Track sessions described above. Art and film presentations are also invited. The official language of the speakers will be English. The Conference is especially interested in presentations about the Holocaust and other genocides that enable us to generalize from an event to subsequent events or patterns, and to develop implications for intervention and prevention of future genocides.

The Conference stipulates that all references to *genocide* refer to actual events of mass murder, and not to other violations of human rights, political rights, or even efforts to destroy a people's cultural identity, though deplorable in their own right. Moreover, all participants in the Conference are urged to bear in mind that references to *genocide* must be linked, throughout, to reverence for the millions of victims of the Holocaust and other genocides whose tragic fates cannot be equated with troubling social issues.

Please join us - whether as a scientist, statesman, community leader, or interested person in any category - in our effort to bring together what has been learned about the past in order that more people can have a future.
